Gay Life in — The Commonwealth

ay rights Activists from the Commonwealth Countries are demanding that laws banning homosexuality should be overturned.

Campaigner Peter Tatchell has said people face violence and imprisonment just because they are gay. So where is homosexuality still outlawed. 37 of the 53 Commonwealth Countries still Criminalise Homosexuality.

Many of the laws criminalising homosexual relations originate from British colonial times. Arrest in these countries are still made. For instance, in 2017, 40 men in Nigeria had been arrested during one weekend for performing homosexual acts.

Jamaica is regarded as a homophobic society and in other countries existing laws have been tightened, including Nigeria & Uganda. A spokesperson from the Commonwealth Secretariat said "We work with the National Human Rights Commission to help encourage national dialogue when it comes to LGBT rights.

Possibly the world's first Gay Rights Movement?

This was founded by Dr. Hirschfeld, pioneer of Sexology and founder in 1897 of the Scientific Humanitarian Committee, which campaigned to repeal paragraph 175 of the German Penal Code;

Hirschfeld's 'Jahrbuch fur Sexuelle Zwischenstufen' was published annually from 1899, a vast work gathering together data of all kinds on the subject of sexuality in general, homosexuality in particular.

His other works include other studies on Transvestism (a term he coined) in 1910, and Homosexuality of men and women in 1914.

ated though many of his theories seem now, with his notions of "intersexes", and homosexuality being "caused" by hormonal imbalance. Perhaps the most valuable thing he accomplished was to put homosexuality into a social context, illustrating that it was a variation of the human sexual experience, and a remarkably common one.

As a Jew, a homosexual and a communist, Hirschfeld did not stand a chance when Hitler's National Socialist Party came to power. In 1933 the institute was destroyed and it's irreplaceable archives lost, this happened while he was on a lecture tour in Paris,

He died two years later and is buried in Nice.

Visit to Woodspring Priory, near Weston – S – Mare

Thursday 10th January 2019 between 1.00pm and 5.00pm.

oodspring Priory lies adjacent to the sea in a quiet valley to the north of W-S-M. Originally founded in 1210, it flourished in the 15th Century when the tower and the nave of the church were rebuilt. At Henry V III dissolution, the buildings became a farmhouse, which was added to in 1701.

The property belongs to the Landmark Trust, which lets it out as holiday accommodation. James has hired it for a short period in January, and is making it available for **GayWest members only** to come and wander round the whole building and grounds between 1and 5pm on the 10th of January.

The Good Times of Mother Clap

e tend to think of gay venues like our Rainbow Cafe as a modern invention, but there was a thriving gay male subculture in the 18th-century in places known as molly houses. These were the precursors to our modern gay pubs and bars.

We provide coffee, cake and conversation, but the molly houses were meeting places where gay men could drink, dance, dress up as women, and indulge in sinful debauchery.

Mother Clap's Molly House situated in north Holborn, London, was the best known example. In 1724, she rented rooms for up to forty men a night (especially on a Sunday) and ran the place as a private coffee house with a back room known as the Chapel for illicit sex.

Mother Clap insisted that her venue was not a male brothel, as no money exchanged hands, but ran her establishment like a private members' club, with music, a welcoming fireplace, and a good flow of drink which she fetched from the Bunch o'Grapes tavern next door. Margaret Clap, a married woman, just loved the company of bawdy gay men.

The good times didn't last long. In 1726, she was snitched on by one Mark Partridge who turned informer. There was a raid which resulted in a series of trials that shocked public opinion. Reforming Societies became over-zealous and there was a witch-hunt of gay men.

other Clap died in Newgate Prison, and strangely enough if it hadn't been for the raid on her house and other venues, and the public outcry that followed, we might not have known that a gay subculture had once thrived in the 1720's.

Forbidden Love

hile on military training during World War Two, Gilbert Bradley was in love. He exchanged hundreds of letters with his sweetheart - who merely signed with the initial "G". But more than 70 years later, it was discovered that G stood for Gordon, and Gilbert had been in love with a man.

Then letters were found after Mr Bradley's death in 2008.

In 1939 he was stationed at Park Hall Camp in Oswestry, Shropshire, to train as an anti-aircraft gunner. He was already in love with Gordon Bowsher. The pair had met on a houseboat holiday in Devon in 1938.

Mr Bowsher was from a well-to-do family. His father ran a shipping company, and the Bowshers also owned tea plantations. When war broke out a year later he trained as an infantryman and was stationed at locations across the country.

At the time, not only was homosexuality illegal, but those in the armed forces could be shot for having gay sex.

Here are some extracts of the letters.

Wednesday January 24th 1939

My darling, ... I lie awake all night waiting for the postman in the early morning, and then when he does not bring anything from you I just exist, a mass of nerves...

All my love forever,

February 12th 1940, Park Grange.

There is nothing more than I desire in life but to have you with me constantly.

Forbidden Love

...I can see or I imagine I can see, what your mother and father's reaction would be... the rest of the world have no conception of what our love is - they do not.

February 1st 1941, K C Gloucester Regiment, Priors Road, Cheltenham

My darling boy, For years I had it drummed into me that no love could last for life...I want you darling seriously to delve into your own mind, and to look for once in to the future. Imagine the time when the war is over and we are living together... would it not be better to live on from now on the memory of our life together when it was at its most golden pitch. Your own G.

Although the couple wrote through out the war, the letters stopped in 1945. However they went on to lead interesting lives. Mr Bowsher moved to California and became a well known horse trainer. In a strange twist, he employed Sirhan, who would go on to be convicted of assassinating Robert Kennedy.

Mr Bradley was briefly entangled with the MP Sir Paul Lathan, who was imprisoned in 1941 following a court marshal for " Improper conduct" with three gunners and a civilian. Sir Paul was exposed after some " indiscreet letters" were discovered.

Mr Bradley died in Brighton in 2008. The letters are now in the Oswestry town Museum. When they were first looked at in detail they realised that what was thought was a girlfriend was in fact a boyfriend.

John Anthony Curry OBE

ohn was the third son born in September 1949 to Rita and Joseph Curry in Birmingham. With leanings to become a dancer, but at his father's objections, he took up figure skating, training at the Summerhill Road ice rink under the guidance of Ken Vickers.

When John was sixteen years old, his father died, and John moved to London to study with Arnold Gerschwiler, through whom he won his first award. In 1972 he met an American sponsor and this enabled him to study in the U.S. with Gus Lussi and Carlo Fassi. The latter coached John to European, World and Olympic titles in 1976, after which he turned professional and formed a touring skating company.

The Company was short lived as John was reported to be difficult to get on with. On Broadway John acted in revivals of Brigadoon and Privates on Parade.

The German tabloid Bild-Zeiting outed John as gay and in 1987 he was diagnosed with HIV and then AIDS: he spent his last years with his mother and died on 15th April 1994 aged 44.

In a biography of the actor Alan Bates, it was claimed Curry and Bates had been having a two year affair, and that Curry had died in Bate's arms. In spite of intensive research this has never been proven.
