A Cautionary warning to all members - regarding the use of E-mails.

When sending an Email message it is important that your message remains safe and only reaches the person you intend it to go to.

To this end -

1. Use a single direct Email, by selecting "Compose and entering the persons Email Address."

DO NOT USE THE REPLY BUTTON from an earlier email.

These will list all the correspondence undertaken, from you and others.

2. If you are sending an Email to more than one person then use the BCC (Blind Copy) Button.

Otherwise it will list all the other people and their email addresses, we often have received Emails with other peoples details which have nothing to do with us, but which does nothing for security of your message.

Please note:- When you receive an Email from any of us, It will be signed "The GayWest Team" and it will always be from info@gaywest.org.uk

Prospect Bristol

rospect was founded about 17 years ago. It has just over 100 members and covers Bristol and surrounding areas.

The aims of the group can be summarised in three points:

- 1. To provide support to prostate cancer patients and their partners and families.
- 2. To keep patients informed of developments in prostate cancer treatment at a local and national level.
- 3. To raise awareness of prostate cancer in our local community.

We hold six formal meetings in the year where we have a range of speakers who talk to us about a variety of prostate cancer related issues. These meetings end with a buffet and time is allowed for members to get together for a chat. The first Thursday of each month we host a drop-in coffee morning at the Macmillan Well Being Centre at Southmead Hospital which is attended by members and newly diagnosed patients. Our meetings provide an open and comfortable environment for men to raise and talk about all sorts of prostate cancer related problems—continence, erectile dysfunction, treatment choices etc. We also have a few social events - a summer lunch at the wonderful Penny Brohn Cancer Centre in Pill, bowls evenings, seasonal walks with a pub lunch thrown in and of course a Christmas lunch.

We raise awareness of prostate cancer through running awareness stands at various sites - golf clubs, Rotary/Probus meetings, prisons, Macmillan sponsored events. Prospect also has a very informative web site (www.prostatecancerbristol.org.uk) which is always worth checking for up to date news about prostate cancer in general and our group's activities in particular.

Tom of Finland

hen Touko Laaksonen, the boy who would become Tom of Finland, was 10 years old he drew his first sex comic. It wasn't about Felix the Cat or Mickey Mouse, but about two tough, blue collar men. In a lecture at the California Institute for the arts in 1985 he said, "I had erotic fantasies very early.



In the 1957 addition of *Physique Pictorial* published by Athletic Model Guild Tom had his first work published. And AMG was his main publisher for over a decade. During the 60's and 70's drawings appeared in several other American magazines, distributed through the mail, the drawings had to be more suggestive than explicit. Protection against arbitrary censorship did not exist. The laws of Finland were far more restrictive, and consequently, much of the

work that Tom had been creating since 1946 remained unpublished for decades.

When censorship was abolished in Denmark, the situation changed dramatically. Danish publisher, DFT, asked Tom in 1968 to submit material for a separate publication. The 20 ink drawings he sent became the first Kake story. The drawings had no captions and needed no translation and by 1980 18 more Kake books had been published under numerous other titles. The books had such titles as *Jack in the Jungle ,The beach boys, and The Happy Harlot*

Tom's second major publisher, Revolt Press, was established in Sweden by a former DFT employee a friend of Tom's who made off with and printed number 8 in the Kake series and then 9 and 10 as well.

fterwards, when the series returned to DFT, Tom supplied Revolt with more material and much of it printed in colour. With titles of *Rope, Loggers, Camping, Sex in the Shed, Dick, and Circus*.

Tom's European titles could not be imported into the United States, but some copies found their way in, and numerous pirated editions were printed, as many as four different editions of some stories, without any royalties going to Tom. The quality of the printing was inferior to the originals. An exception was the authorized edition of *Ringo & the Renegades* in 1973. Several major American magazines began to feature drawings regularly but by 1981 Tom was still without an American publisher for his stories.

In 1982 Durk Dehner urged Tom to create his own publishing firm, and together they founded The Tom of Finland Foundation. Since then, the company has printed many new titles and reissued most old



ones. It has also published anthologies entitled *Cops in Toms Drawings*, *Navy in Toms Drawings*.

Even though much of Tom's work has been published and much still in print, the majority of his pencil drawings have never been published.

We boarded the Ship Magellan at Bristol's Portbury docks for a 16 night cruise organized by CMV cruises. Not one of the floating hotels we see these days but a more traditional ship consisting of 12 decks and total passenger numbers of 1200. This was not a sun seeking trip, and it was certainly not, but a most interesting and enjoyable experience, the highlight of the trip being our two days in St Petersburg, Russia.

We became friendly with some gays strutting there stuff and with two lovely married couples from Newcastle and a couple from Pershore In Worcestershire. As is always the case on the four cruises we have been on everyone is so friendly no matter who you are.

Our first port of call was Rotterdam in the Netherlands, from where we visited the world heritage site Kinderdijk for its Windmills . Next was Copenhagen in Denmark, a beautiful city where we enjoyed a sunny afternoon enjoying the sites.

Onto Warnemude on the Baltic coast of Germany, another interesting place, and a town that was popular as a holiday destination when this part of Germany was under Soviet Russian control. It still shows signs of those times today. Our next stop was the capital city of Estonia, Tallin. Here we went on a panoramic tour of the city. Estonia became independent from the Soviet block in 1991.

Our main destination was next, St Petersburg. Our first trip out was a full panoramic tour of this city of palaces and statues and canals that remind you of Venice. The influence of Russia's past is all to be seen, and to me it was no surprise that there was a revolution in 1917. On the outskirts of the city you have blocks and blocks of apartments for the less affluent. Very noticeable even today.

ur next day in St Petersburg was a visit to the Faberge's museum.

Located in the restored Shuvalov Palace a place of pure affluence and grandeur on a massive scale. We unfortunately could not even afford one of the replica eggs in the gift shop. But we did get a fridge magnet! At least we were given a free glass of wine.

By now the temperature was 7c and rain and sleet but it did not spoil our time in this amazing city of palaces and churches.

On now we travelled to Finland and Helsinki, the coldest time of the trip regarding the weather only 4 c and light snow. Again we did a tour of the area which included Sibelius Memorial Park named after the famous composer and where there is a monument of pipes (as in organ) to him. Of course you all will know that Finland was the home of another famous man,

Next we were visiting a very old walled city on the island of Gotland, Sweden. A remarkable town that still has its ancient walls surrounding the old town. Being it was a Saturday all shops and cafes did not open until 10am. The beauty of the ship we were on is that you can sail the ship right into the harbour and then just walk off and into the town.

After Sweden, we had three days at sea before arriving in Cobh, Ireland just south of Cork. Again just walk of the ship and enjoy your new surroundings, after this it was back to Bristol. An amazing trip with lots to see amazing history with beautifully clean cities. Good entertainment on board the Magellan and excellent food. You did need your sea legs at times but well worth it.
