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Open Letters to Queer Britain

Throughout history, the experiences of LGBTQ+ people have often been erased, overlooked or marginalised, leaving a gap in our national story. Queer Britain wants to change this so that future generations can see themselves represented in history. With the support of Levi's® and Post Office, Queer Britain is inviting members of the LGBTQ+ community and its allies to share an open letter with the museum. The letters will live in Queer Britain's ever-growing archive and will help to record and preserve valuable accounts of what it means to be LGBTQ+ in Britain today.

The letters will be studied by historians at both Goldsmiths, University of London and Kent State University, as part of the 'Queer Pandemic: Resilience in Times of Crisis' research project. The study looks at how queer identities and communities have been shaped and strengthened by both the COVID-19 pandemic and previous crises, including the AIDS epidemic, violence, criminalisation and restricted access to healthcare.

About Queer Britain

Queer Britain is a charity working to establish the UK's first national LGBTQ+ museum. Co-founded in 2018 by Joseph Galliano, Queer Britain is set to be arguably one of the most important museums to launch in the UK. It will shine a light on its communities' rich and complex history becoming an essential place for all, regardless of sexuality or gender identity, to discover the diverse history and culture of LGBTQ+ people throughout the UK and beyond.

Paul Robeson

He became well known for his beautiful, expressive, bass-baritone voice. In addition to being a singer, he was an actor, both stage and screen.

He was also a fine athlete and a professional footballer.

He was born in 1898 in America, the son of a slave, where he lived until his death in 1976. His father must have inspired him to serve the down-trodden and disadvantaged, not only in the USA, but abroad, including Soviet Russia, which he visited and addressed large gatherings.

Not surprisingly, this attracted the attention of the notorious Senator McCarthy, who labelled him a Communist, resulting in the loss of his passport for some years.

This did limit his opportunities abroad; however, by this time, his fame as a singer of so many popular songs in many different styles was well established, worldwide.

I treasure my recordings of his singing, some of which can move me to tears.
