#### The Black Mozart

oseph Boulogne Chevalier de Sainte George and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart were contemporaries. the former came to be known as The Black Mozart. His father was a wealthy French planter in Guadeloupe, a French island in the Caribbean, who dallied with a 16 years old slave girl of his wife. The result was a brown-skinned mulatto boy.

When the boy was 10 years old, his father took him to France because he exhibited a musical talent. Here he was given private tuition in music and also lessons in fencing, he soon became proficient in both, resulting in being noticed by Louis XV no less, who described him as 'the most accomplished man in France in riding, shooting, fencing and music' and named him after his father.



He was invited to join the 'Concert des Amateurs' as principal violinist and later became its Concertmaster. In 1775 he composed 2 symphonie concertantes for 2 soloists and orchestra. He went on to compose, believe it or not, 2 symphonies, 7 violin concertos, chamber music, songs, and also operas, which were not received so well.

In my humble opinion, his music is as fine as that by Mozart, which is a considerable achievement, yet it is so rarely heard, which is a shame, although he has been 'Composer of the week'.

In 1778 Mozart went to Paris and stayed for 2 months under the same roof as as the Black Mozart, whom he must have met, one can imagine his feelings of envy. Joseph also visited London, and Brighton, to see the Royal Pavilion.

In 1792 Louis XV established a light army of coloured men which Joseph joined. He then sailed to the Caribbean once more, changed his mind, and returned to France and tried to re-join the army, but was refused, so he became involved in revolutionary activities, was briefly imprisoned and narrowly avoided the guillotine. By this time his health was

deteriorating badly and finally he died of a kidney disease in 1799.

If you wish to hear his music, you can find it on YouTube, particularly played by Buskaid, in Soweto, South Africa, and London, in Trafalgar Square, when they honoured the birthday of Nelson Mandela.
