Kathleen Ferrier - Contralto

I have loved for many years her voice and her style of singing, she conveyed emotion which could move me to tears, and she was also very able in many other musical areas. She had a humble beginning to her so short career.

She was an ordinary Lancashire Lass, born on 22nd April 1912 in Higher Walton, near Preston. She had two older siblings, a sister, Winifred and a brother, George. The family moved to Blackburn in 1914, so that her father, a schoolmaster could become headmaster there. Music was the primary source of pleasure for her family.

Her voice was not Kathleen's first instrument, as she showed great talent for the piano, and was taught from the age of five by an excellent teacher, achieving a high standard by fourteen.

On leaving school at fourteen, she was employed as a telephone operator. Meanwhile, she entered many piano competitions, frequently winning them, and won an upright piano as a prize. Although her principal study was the piano, she sang frequently with her family. In 1934 she entered The Blackpool Festival as a singer and asked the choirmaster and organist to give her suggestions. At a competition in Carlisle in 1935, she entered as a contralto and won the the first prize of a rose bowl.

From then on, she became a professional singer. In 1942 she performed in Handel's Messiah, and after an audition with Malcolm Sargent, she moved to London and became a concert artist, performing at the Wigmore Hall, an important venue. Her repertoire now included Bach's St Mathews Passion and Elgar's Dream of Gerontius and a good deal more. Also, in 1942, she sang at Glyndebourne in Sussex with Peter Pears, the partner of Benjamin Britten, in an opera of his.

She performed in 1945 at several London Promenade Concerts. Then at the Edinburgh Festival; she also sang at many different places throughout the UK. then Europe, and eventually in America. She made world tours, becoming very well known. Her many recordings of songs became very popular and remain so.

In 1952, at the height of her fame, she was diagnosed with breast cancer and ordered, to her horror, no more work. However, she defied this and continued to perform, despite increasing pain. In 1953, she had surgery and radiotherapy, but to no avail. During one performance, her femur bone disintegrated, she struggled to continue, held up by the other performers, to the end.

She was awarded The Gold Medal of The Royal Philharmonic Society. She passed away shortly after, at the age of 42.

In 1953, it was said of her that year, she was very nearly the most popular woman in England, second only to the young Queen of England.

Andre' Rieu invited the young boy (who we found out was just 9 years old) to play along with the orchestra, the crowd went wild and it was just an amazing thing to see. There were 4 concerts at the venue and the lad was invited to the next days were Andre' Rieu presented the boy with a gift of a brand new quality flute. The boy was speechless and so pleased. So quite a different show than normal but everyone went home very pleased and many in tears after such an emotional event.

Three years after the drama was filmed The BBC has been able to release the trailer.

The Drama, **Four Lives**, tells the story of the gay men killed by Stephen Port after he met them on line and gave them fatal doses of a date-rape drug. It had been set for release in 2020 but was delayed by an inquest into the Metropolitan police's failings in the investigation into the murders in 2014 and 2015 in east London.

Stephen Merchant portrays Port, who was given a whole life sentence in 2016. Sheridan smith stars as Sarah Sak, the mother of victim Anthony Walgate, 23, who wrote a book about her sons death.

The three-part drama by Neil McKay will run from January 3 on consecutive nights.
