Welcome to your July Newsletter

Apart from some nice sunny weather, not always guaranteed, summer time here in the Uk is full of music festivals, summer fetes, and lots of sport such as Cricket. But LGBT+ people also get involved in celebrating pride events, expressing who they are. Well that's what the original idea was.

The first pride march in the UK was on the 1st July 1972 in London. The date being chosen on the closest Saturday to the Anniversary of Stonewall riots of June 28th 1969.

About 2000 people attended including Peter Tatchell who was one of the organisers. Pride was not owned or trademarked by a single organisation, which meant that they were not held consistently during the 70's and 80's although more were held in London during this time. 2022 was the 50th anniversary of the first pride.

As an LGBT organisation GayWest over the years have supported and taken part in many prides. Back during the 80's and 90's the group organised coaches to the London pride marches. Not always to everyone's liking and occasional disputes with other organisations took place. In later years the group started to have its own stall at the local prides. These included, Bristol, Swindon, Gloucester and Weston-S-Mare. Many were excellent events, some with some good entertainment and lovely vibes. The group made many contacts with other LGBT organisations during these events.

Since 2015 GayWest has taken part in some of the pride events that take place in our local prisons.

The fist was at Ashfield in Pucklechurch then later at Leyhill, near Wotton Under Edge, and Erlestoke, near Devises. This year we will be joining Leyhill and Erlestoke at their pride events.

The last main pride event the group took part in was in 2018 at the Bristol pride.

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In 2019 we were unable to find enough volunteers to run the stall and by this time the view of many was that the prides were changing in their appeal. As a mainly elderly LGBT group some felt that we were not all that welcomed.

In discussions with some of the pride organisers during this time it was obvious to me that the prides were becoming too political, not something many of us in GayWest wished to be involved with and something which the group has been proud not to have taken a stance on. So after the pandemic and with the prides back on we have not been asked to take part in the commercial pride events. Looking at the program for this years Bristol pride there is not one actual LGBT social community organisation like GayWest, representing the Community at the event at all.

Today the original pride flag has been changed beyond its original concept, having been hijacked for others political aims. The latest being this year where an infinity symbol has been added. So is there a need for prides now?

Gaywest High Summer,

July can be an odd time of year in the garden. I have often heard it said that July is an in-between month. This means that not a lot is in flower or I have heard it said nothing flowers for 3 weeks after June. With exception to planting bedding plants in our gardens there is actually a lot of plants for our borders with a little plant knowledge and planning, July like a lot of months can and is an explosion of colour, scent and variety.

Like all things in the garden, we need to think in layers, this means to use plants to create interest in our borders. For instance, the use of bulbs, perennials, shrubs and half-hardy annuals.

Bulbs for the July Garden

Alliums are great for the summer borders. They bring interest like Allium red Mohican, as it brings its flowering head up it looks like a Shepherd crook before they are finally erect and the flower head is on top. Maybe the use of Allium sphaerocehalon, grows to 60cms and has large purple flowers. All Alliums are loved by pollinating insects.

If you want intoxicating scent in the garden then the use of oriental lilies is a must. These large trumpets of many colours give out a heady perfume.

Half-hardy annuals for the July garden

For a little effort of sowing seeds in the spring, plants like Larkspur, Nigella, Godetia, Clarkia etc., are a must for any garden and are great of filling in those small spaces where other plants have finished flowering.











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Perennials for July

The list is actually endless for this group of plants. Many of the plants that flower this month are still flowering much later in the year but this is the month that they start.

For a dramatic architectural plant, you can't go wrong with Cynara cardunculus – globe thistle. It has stately silver cut foliage and the biggest blue thistle flowers. But a large border or garden needed.

For long flowering the Helenium's are a must. Helenium sahins early is an amazing plant reaching 60 +cms will flower with dead heading way into November.

Other notable plants for this month include, Alstroemeria, Dahlia, Campanula, Kniphofia, Tanacetum, Leucanthemum, Lychinus, Phlox, and many others

All the plants of the above can also be used for cutting to create beautiful flower arrangements in our homes.

Shrubs for July

Roses are always a must. Hybrid T and floribundas being better as most repeat flower and give us a oh so pleasant scent, along with Philadelphus. Hypericum Hidcote and Lavendula are a few more to add into the mix.
